Reading from Lamentations (S: Steve, C: Cathy, A: All)

S: I remember my affliction and my wandering, the bitterness and the gall.

C: I well remember them, and my soul is downcast within me.

S: My eyes flow unceasingly, without relief. What I see brings grief to my soul.

C: The waters closed over my head, and I thought I was about to be cut off.

S: Joy is gone from our hearts; our dancing has turned to mourning.

C: But we are not cast off by the Lord forever.

S: Though life brings grief, God will show compassion.

C: I called on your name, from the depths of the pit. You heard my plea. You came near when I called.

Congregational Songs

2. HEARING GOD'S WORD

Responsive Reading (Revelation 7:9-17)

Reader one: After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. They cried out in a loud voice, saying,

Choir: "Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!"

Reader two: And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, singing,


Choir: "Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen."

Reader two: Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, "Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?" I said to him, "Sir, you are the one that knows." Then he said to me,

Reader three: "These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them. They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat: for the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes."
